

Title	Disability Task Force		
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Synopsis:	Disability Task Force Senate Bill 5180 created a task force to develop recommendations that will improve access to postsecondary education for students with disabilities. The task force is composed of 29 individuals representing K-12, postsecondary institutions, citizens, government and non-government organizations. The Council provides staff support for the task force. The task force must submit recommendations to the Governor's Office annually for 3 years.		
Guiding questions:	 How can the state make the transition from K-12 to postsecondary education more seamless and successful? How can K-12 and postsecondary institutions share best practices? How can school districts, in collaboration with students and families, ensure proper documentation for postsecondary education is completed before students graduate from high school? How can school districts and postsecondary institutions improve outreach to parents and students about their options in postsecondary education?

Background

SB 5180 – 2013 Legislative Session.

- Task force to improve access to postsecondary education for students with disabilities.
- Composed of 29 members appointed by 10 different organizations.
- Requires the Council to staff the task force and submit a report to the Legislature 12/1/2013.

Key Issues:

K-12 and postsecondary education are "distinctly different parts of the educational system."

Lack of meaningful student involvement in IEP (Individualized Education Program).

Lack of communication between K-12 and postsecondary institutions.

Difference in legal requirements and expectations for K-12 vs. postsecondary education.

Equipment and transferability of resources.

Documentation

Postsecondary students must document the need for accommodations.

Students must self-identify.

Accommodations versus curriculum modifications.

College documentation requirements are not always met by K-12 records.

Obtaining documentation can be a financial burden to students.

Outreach

Information directed at students with disabilities is lacking in content and availability.

Current system is difficult to navigate and there is not a comprehensive source of information.

K-12 and postsecondary institution communication is needed to improve strategies.

Gap/deficit of information being passed on to students and parents.

Recommendations

1. On ReadySetGrad.org: include comprehensive information for students with disabilities about transitioning from K-12 to postsecondary.

2. Improve alignment between High School and Beyond Plan and IEP's postsecondary transition plan.

3. K-12 staff should support college and career readiness skills for students with disabilities, and give them opportunities to practice those skills.



Recommendations

4. Allocate more funding for the following purposes:

- Postsecondary evaluations.
- More comprehensive services and accomodations.
- Increased professional development opportunities.
- Postsecondary outreach programs to K-12 classrooms.

5. The Council should develop a statewide Listserv to facilitate communication between K-12 and postsecondary
