

Diploma & Credential by 2023

All adults ages 25-44 in Washington will have a high school diploma or equivalent.

Current level of attainment: 89%

At least 70% of Washington adults ages 25-44 will have a postsecondary credential.

• Current level of attainment: 50%





Other Goal Setting Efforts

- Lumina: By 2025, 60% of Americans will hold highquality degrees, certificates or other postsecondary credentials.
- Oregon: By 2025 <u>all</u> Oregonians adults will hold a high school diploma or equivalent, 40% will have an associate's degree or postsecondary certificate, and 40% will hold a bachelor's or advanced degree.
- California: By 2020, one million more Californians will hold bachelor's degree or higher and one million more will hold an associate's degree or certificate.

Metrics

Number & percentage of Washingtonians completing a high school diploma or equivalent.

Percentage of the population enrolled in a postsecondary certificate, apprenticeship, or degree program.

Number of postsecondary certificates, apprenticeships, & degrees awarded annually.

Ensure Access



- Ensure cost is not a barrier for lowincome students.
- Make college affordable.
- Ensure all high school graduates are career and college ready.
- Streamline and expand dualcredit programs.
- Increase support for all current and prospective students.

Enhance Learning



- Align postsecondary programs with employment opportunities.
- Provide greater access to workbased learning opportunities.
- Encourage adults to earn a postsecondary credential.
- Leverage technology to improve student outcomes.


